NEWS FROM TESTBOURNE COMMUNITY SCHOOL

We have got off to a good, positive start to the school year, in spite of the prevailing damp conditions and excess of wet lunchtimes! Our new Year 7s seem to be settling in well and we have been pleased to welcome some new staff and are enjoying improvements to our site.

STAFFING CHANGES A number of new staff have joined us this year, including:

Mr. Árcher in PE; Miss Clacy in Music/Performing Arts; Mr. Ferrier in Special Needs/English; Mrs. Pate as Head of Design Technology and Mrs. Shearing as Head of Humanities/Geography

SITE IMPROVEMENTS Major improvement works have been going on over the summer holiday:

- Two old laboratories have been gutted and completely refurbished and one classroom has been converted into a demonstration lab. These will provide excellent, modern facilities for Science lessons.
- All the ceilings and lights in our Scola block, built in the 70s, have been replaced.
- Stairwells and downstairs corridors in that block have been decorated, with upstairs due to be done at half term.

Amongst other works there has been some redecoration in the Sports Hall Entrance and ICT Suite; our Learning Support Team has moved to the refurbished Caretaker's House; our Administrative and Support Offices have been reorganised; a new Connexions Office has been created.

We are very pleased with the improvements which are part of our ongoing plan to ensure Testbourne provides excellent facilities and a bright, smart, stimulating environment for us all to work in and enjoy.

RESULTS ROUNDUP This year we are pleased to report that we have met or our targets at Key Stage 3 and 4, based on information received so far. The targets are set taking account of the academic profile and previous attainment of the cohort and can, therefore, vary from year to year.

We know that pupils achieved well in their Key Stage 3 SATs. We did not, however, receive the English results until near the end of the holiday ~ and we still do not have a full set of Mathematics and Science results, with some individual levels still missing! Until these arrive we still do not have final percentages.

At Key Stage 4, pupils were bang on target with 67% of pupils achieving 5 A* - C GCSE passes. Congratulations to our ex-Head Boy, Sean Main, who has just achieved a clean sweep of A grades at Peter Symonds and is off to Kings College London to study Medicine

"FUN FAIR" We run a host of extra-curricular activities and this year ran a lunchtime "Fun Fair" ~ with stalls organised by prefects ~ to let pupils know all the different opportunities open to them. Clubs ranged from Chess to Choir to Cricket. There was a really good turn-out, with lots of pupils signing up to use their free time well!

This report covers the September meeting and meetings of the Open Spaces and Footpaths committees. Minutes of meetings are in the parish council area on the village website www.longparish.org.uk.

First Responders

Roger Tym explained how he had set up a First Responder group in Stockbridge. The aim of the scheme is to organise trained volunteers to reach medical emergencies within 5 minutes and give first aid before the ambulance can arrive. A group needs about 8 volunteers and has to raise funds for equipment, such as a heart defibrillator. It works under the control of the NHS Ambulance service. The Council agreed that it would be a good idea for Longparish, and Liz Bourne agreed to explore the practicalities.

Open Spaces

The village clean up day will be on 22 November. There will be more in the next Hill & Valley. Please reserve the date so you can help keep our village looking good.

Catherine Sweet has resigned as chair of the Open Spaces committee. The Council is very grateful for all the work she has done over a period of some years. For the time being responsibility for open spaces work will be shared. Andy Smith had agreed to take responsibility for the Playground, and will pursue the quotation for mending the skate ramp. Jenny Jolliffe will organise the clear-up days and Jeremy Barber will undertake the administration.

Footpaths

Phil Wood of Andover Ramblers, who has joined the footpaths committee, was very complimentary about the excellent state of the paths in the parish. Thanks go to Paul Knipe who has mended the broken kissing gate just downstream of Upper Mill and to the landowners and volunteers who keep our paths in such good order.

Roads

The new pavement provides a safe route between the village hall car parks and the school. It was one of the objectives of the Parish Plan and the School Travel Plan. Please use it so as to avoid the congestion, confusion and danger to children caused by parking at school and on the gravel area by the church.



East Aston Common

We understand that Mr & Mrs Tacchi have revived their proposal to lodge an application to extinguish common rights over approximately 20 acres of common land at East Aston Common (mainly comprising river bed and islands). In exchange they would grant new common rights over approximately 33 acres of cow pasture (known as Nether Regions and Bank) in the parish of Hurstbourne Priors on the East side of the B3048 to the East of East Aston. This idea was mooted last year

when sounding in the two villages showed no support. The current common land extends from The Cleeves to Britwell Priors and includes some of the most beautiful and nature-rich areas of the village. We will keep you informed of developments. If an application is made it is likely that the matter will go to a public enquiry.

Planning

The council had no objection to

- a rear extension at 61 North Acre
- a garage at 1 Gladstone Terrace
- tree works at Malthouse Cottage and The Willows
- re-thatching with reed on a small area at the rear of Newton Cottage
- alterations at Foxdale House

The council decided to object to

- a replacement dwelling at The Bungalow, Mill Lane, on grounds of size
- an extension at River Cottage, Forton because the proposal included a third floor which is contrary to TVBC policy and the Village Design Statement.

The next parish council meeting is on Monday 13 October. Meetings are public. Parishioners are welcome to come and can speak by invitation.

What is wrong with the horse chestnut trees?

Many of our horse chestnut trees are looking very sick. This can be due to a number of reasons, two are serious, the others less so. The serious ones that cause bleeding cankers are a fungus (Phytophora spp) and a bacterium (Pseudomonas spp). They can be recognised by dark, tarry stains on the bark, which they kill. If the branch or the tree is completely girdled then the branch or the whole tree will die. The fungus has been around for a long time but the bacterium has only recently been recognised and seems to be much more virulent. How virulent remains to be seen, so the scare stories about the end of the horse chestnut seem premature.

The commoner damages are more striking but less lethal. There are several fungi that cause leaf blotches and also a little leaf miner moth. This moth arrived from the continent in 2002. Its caterpillars live inside the leaves, eating away and causing large pale dead areas. As many as 700 caterpillars have been recorded from a single leaf. Bad attacks cause the leaves to shrivel and die so that the trees take on an autumnal look much earlier than normal, although horse chestnuts often do take on autumn colours earlier than other trees. Although disfiguring, neither the leaf miner nor the fungal leaf blotches are life threatening to the tree, which has made most of its growth before the leaves are severely damaged.

There are no known cures for bleeding cankers, nor is there much that can be done to control damage to the leaves. Sweeping up the leaves from around a favourite tree and then burning them would seem to be about the best one could do. So far our village trees do not seem to have bleeding cankers but a survey will be made when the trees have lost their leaves.
