LONGPARISH CONSERVATION AREA REVIEW

Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) is carrying out a comprehensive review of all conservation areas within the Borough in accordance with the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990, and is currently reviewing the Longparish Conservation Area. The conservation area was designated 25 years ago in 1983 and a lot of changes have happened not only in the village but also the way in which conservation areas are administered. The main reason for the review therefore is to check that the conservation area boundary is up to date, and to prepare a conservation area character appraisal setting out what it is that gives the area its distinctive and unique character. The Council has prepared an appraisal of the village and is holding an exhibition summarising the appraisal and suggesting changes to the conservation area boundary.

The Council is holding the exhibition at: Longparish Village Hall on Monday 19th January 2009 from 2.00 – 8.00 pm

to provide an opportunity for residents to express their views.

We value your input, as you know much more about your own village than we could ever do and if we have made any factual errors we'd love to know! Your comments are important, so please come along if you can.

ST NICHOLAS WIVES GROUP

In March 1959 a group of over 20 young ladies living in Longparish decided to form a group to meet once a month in the Rectory or at each other houses. The group became known as the "Longparish Young Wives Group" and the first Chairman was Mrs Agg-Large, the Rector's

wife. Later when Mrs Patricia Dawnay became chairman most meetings were held in Longparish House and later at Ropers.

The group became heavily involved in the village activities such as cleaning the church, looking after the tea tent at the Village Fete, the Harvest Festival Supper and the St Nicholas Sale. The Group also looked beyond the village and over the years it has donated many hundreds of pounds to various local and national charities. I have neither recollection nor information as to when the group's name changed to the "St Nicholas Wives Group" as it is now known, but we still have some founder members.

I joined nearly twenty years ago when Jim and I first moved to the village. After the sad death of Mrs Dawnay in 1989, it was proposed that Mrs Nancy Goodwin and Mrs Peggy Snow should act as joint chair, but sadly Mrs Peggy Snow had to retire due to ill health. In 1992, Mrs Daphne Bevan was then chair till 2007, and following her move to Newbury became our Life President. The group wishes to thank Daphne, who has served and worked tirelessly during her 15 years of office. She kept the group going, hosting the annual dinner from 1989 to 2002 and most of the monthly meetings at 'Woodstock'.

Unfortunately due to circumstances beyond anyone's control, last October the group decided that it would have to close, as there was no nominees coming forward for the Chair or Secretary's post and the membership was dwindling. The group decided however to continue until March 2009 and celebrate the group's 50TH ANNIVERSARY, when to our gratitude Rita Twine stepped in to help and became Chair and Mandy Robbins volunteered as Secretary. Unfortunately Mandy has had to resign and we are still without a secretary. Rita does not wish to continue in the office of chair after the March celebration, and I having been treasurer for well over 11 years also do not wish to continue. Therefore to everyone's regret the St Nicholas Wives Group will cease to exist on the 19th March 2009

The President, Chairman, Treasurer and all the members of the group, past and present would like to thank everyone who has contributed to the Group over many happy and successful years, in particular Mrs Dinesen who allowed us to have our yearly B.B.Q. in her beautiful garden, the members who held meetings in their homes, the Village Hall committee for the use of the Village Hall, and all those who have given donations and help

The group hopes that someone in the village will volunteer to keep this tradition of a Ladies Group going. Whoever volunteers will need to bring new ideas and interests to the group.

Finally on the **19th MARCH 2009** to celebrate the 50th Anniversary we will be holding a celebration service at St Nicholas Church and afterwards there will be drinks and canapés at the Village Hall.

The committee and members of the group would like to invite past members and the village community to come and celebrate this memorable occasion with us.

The biggest memorial visited was Thiepval where the names of 70,000 missing soldiers are

carved on the stone. The finale was awesome with HMS Bulwark picking us all up in landing craft at Dunkirk and then dropping us off on



the beaches at Dover. The final cycling took us down Whitehall to the Cenotaph where a brief service of remembrance was held by the bikers and the many family and friends who had turned up, thank you.

Talking of the future; I plan to do the H4H Bike Ride (Band of Brothers) again in 2009, this time from Cherbourg to Paris. I have been fortunate enough to be picked from the many applications submitted from the bikers that undertook this years bike ride to be one of the 30 that will act as mentors for those that need help from now till May and during the ride. First Responders

Over the past couple of editions of Hill and Valley, it has been reported that a "first responders" scheme for Longparish would be a good idea. Although the Ambulance service gets to most calls very quickly, sometimes it may not be quickly enough - especially in countryside areas or large commercial complexes. There is a period of time between the 999 call being made and the ambulance arriving in which little or no emergency care takes place. This time period has been called the 'therapeutic vacuum'. We know that community based First Responders can fill this vacuum and provide essential simple treatment in those crucial first few minutes before the ambulance arrives.

First Responders are asked by the Ambulance Communications Centre to attend emergencies in their area. The types of emergencies attended may range from collapse due to medical problems and accidents in the home or public place. First Responder groups usually consist of 10 - 15 volunteers from the local community. One member of the group is designated as the 'group coordinator'. All the volunteers live and work in the local area, and with a rota scheme, one member of the volunteer group is available and 'on call', 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. They are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the Ambulance Service and to deliver Basic Life Support and defibrillation to patients in Cardiac Arrest and appropriate calls including oxygen administration to patients suffering from a range of conditions. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance.

Following a discussion with the Ambulance Headquarters in Winchester, it appears that there is an average of 6 times per year in Longparish when a Community Responder Scheme would have been called to an emergency. This might not seem like very much, however even one life saved makes such a scheme worthwhile.

In order to set up a group in Longparish, we need to have sufficient volunteers willing to take their turn "on call". If enough people are interested, we can proceed to the next level which is to organise training. Longparish Estate Footpaths


The parish council works with landowners and the County footpaths team to improve our 20 miles of footpaths. Research for the Parish Plan showed how much parishioners value paths which enable us to see the river and walk near it. One such is the path from the shop to Upper Mill. With the co-operation of the landowners, volunteers have put in two kissing gates to make this path more accessible but the stiles at both ends of the bridge make it difficult for less sprightly walkers and dogs.

Most of this path lies on land forming part of the Longparish Estate. For some years there have been no grazing livestock in the field between the bridge and Upper Mill with the result that the pasture has become overgrown with nettles and coarse vegetation. The estate changed hands last summer and the new owner, Chris Woodhouse, intends to bring this pasture back into good order. Walkers using the footpaths between the shop and Upper Mill will have noticed the sheep. The way they graze helps improve the pasture and grazing by both sheep and cattle is part of Chris's long-term plans for managing the pasture land. As there has been no livestock for some years, dogs have become accustomed to roaming in the meadow. This has led to some problems with dogs not being under close control and disturbing the sheep. Some dogs have also been

entering the river from the bridge or the nearby banks. This disturbs the gravel bed, which is a spawning ground for trout, and the stones the dogs retrieve and leave on the banks damage machines used for maintenance.

The Countryside Code explains that, by law, you must control your dog so it does not disturb farm animals or wildlife. You do not have to put your dog on a lead on public paths so long as it is under close control but you should keep it on a lead if you cannot rely on its obedience.

Chris is keen to improve public access. He has cut back the trees overhanging the bridge which is very welcome. In consultation with the County Council Rights of Way team and the parish council he has been considering how best to balance improved public access with his plans for managing the land. The result is a plan to improve access by replacing the stiles at each end of the bridge with kissing gates or hand gates and improve the fencing on and around the bridge to prevent dogs entering the river. It may prove necessary for Chris to put a fence along the footpath in the meadow beyond the bridge. Walkers prefer open paths to fenced ones and the parish council hopes this will not be necessary. In addition, Chris is happy for walkers to use a route just inside the field along the B3048 (see map) to save using the road and is working with the HCC footpaths team to make this into an official permissive path. This is on the understanding that no right of way is created.



In the view of the parish council these are both very worthwhile improvements.

Conservation Area

Community Association

The council made a grant of £1,440 to the Longparish Community Association to support their work with the youth club and elderly people and the monthly events diary.

16 year-old Longparish gymnast Amy Jones came 5th in last month's British Acrobatic Gymnastics Tournament. The council was delighted to hear of Amy's success and decided to sponsor her with £100 towards the cost of training and transport.

Planning The council had no objection to

- An extension at Woodstock, East Aston
- Minor extension and internal alterations at Tudor Cottage
- An extension and attic room at River Cottage, Forton
- An extension at 61 North Acre (revised plans)
- Tree works at Nordale and Longparish School

After careful thought the council decided to object to felling of two birch trees at Test Cottage because of the contribution they make to the village landscape.

At TVBC Northern Area Planning Committee, the council spoke in support of the applicant about the proposed new thatched cottage next to Paddock Cottages. The outcome was that the committee approved the cottage but with clay tiles on the roof instead of thatch.

Councillors have also attended two public inquiries to represent the council. The first was about whether the old ford just downstream of Upper Mill is a public right of way and the second about Mr Jackson's application to retain the residential caravan at Testwood Trout Farm as temporary accommodation for an agricultural worker. The results are not expected until around the end of January.

The next parish council meeting is on Monday, January 12. Meetings are public. Parishioners are welcome to come and can speak by invitation.

New Local Consultation Process for Determining Admission Arrangements

The Education and Skills Bill currently progressing through Parliament will make changes to the admissions law, provided it receives Royal Assent. The Government has decided to go ahead with proposals in the Bill to consult on school admissions. This means that for admission arrangements for entry in 2010/11, the School is required to consult with relevant parents and other groups with an interest in the local area (for example, community groups). In addition to this notice, therefore, the School will also be contacting interested groups directly.
